6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The curriculum prescribed by the affiliating University was developed partially by introducing two value added courses in 1st & 2nd semesters and one honours supportive course in 3rd semester.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Teaching and learning is substantially improved by introducing two ICT supported class rooms and changing the old teacher- centred teaching -learning method to student- centred/autonomous teaching- learning method as far as practicable.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Examination and Evaluation is improved by introducing the system of continuous internal assessment (CIA) and semester end examination system for each semester.

6.3.4 Research and Development

Some teachers are carrying on research works with or without financial aids from funding agencies. Sustainable development of research facilities have been maintained in the institution.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

There is one Central Library with the capacity of 100 students. Standard text and reference books are provided in the library, ICT infrastructure and Inlibnet facility, through which e-books & e-journals can be opened, have been installed in the library.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The non-teaching staff were assigned to their respective works and teachers are also allocated their duties by the respective Heads. Teachers were allowed to participate refresher/orientation/workshop courses at different Institutions inside or outside the state for improvement of knowledge from time to time. Mechanisms were provided for the students to use full college time inside the classrooms/library/concerned departments.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Recruitment of faculty and staff is done by the State Government. The institution requests the Government to fill up the vacant posts of the College in time.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The Institution organised an International Conference cum Workshop on Bamboo in collaboration with Salai Holdings Pvt. Ltd.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

The College conducted Entrance test for admission to B.A./B.Sc. 1st semester. Counselling sessions were held for successful candidates and admission was undertaken according to the available seats.

The CIA comprises OMR format question series technique, group discussion, project work and quiz, and the SEES consists of short, very short and essay type questions.

Plan of action chalked out by the IQAC in the beginning of the year towards quality enhancement.

As preparatory practice with the approval of the Manipur University Academic Council, college has implemented 40:60 CIA and End Semester Examinations for 2014 session. IQAC established an environment of students centred teaching learning and evaluation method. To test the real test of the autonomous learning or students centred learning. IQAC convened many discussions and debates for autonomous learning. Through discussions and debates to implement the fresh autonomous status from the year 2014 itself. Members began to work on available data and information from internet and other resource persons. The college was celebrating year long Golden Jubilee celebration in 2014, and the closing days of the celebration that was 8th August, 2014. The Fresh autonomous was implemented by the V.C. of Manipur University by unfolding the autonomous stone. The college website has been updated from stagnancy to dynamics.

Details plan of action for the year 2014-2015:

1. Reformation of teaching learning and evaluation system from out of surface learning to autonomous learning.
2. To provide an academic atmosphere which is vibrant creative and constructive.
3. Constant academic discussion and deliberation in order to translate the vision of the college into reality.
4. To start more career oriented courses.
5. To open new courses at under graduate and to start post graduate classes.
6. Development of Infrastructure especially in terms of class rooms & laboratory from RUSA fund.
7. To modernise and revamp the library.
8. To introduce more teaching aids to improve the teaching learning process.
9. To encourage innovative practices.
10. To organise more seminars, workshops, etc. to spread among others, the issue of the necessity of academic autonomy.
11. ICT training for teaching and non teaching staff of the College.

12. Full automation of the Administrative block & Central library.
13. To implement the autonomous learning skills by the faculty members.
14. To implement the examination reforms with accountability, transparency and responsibility.
15. To start 2 more COC which was granted by UGC from the 2015-16 session?
16. To work towards opening of Life science P.G. programme in the nearest future.
17. To introduce Bulk SMS for students and parents for effective communication

Outcomes achieved by the end of the year 2014-2015

1. Under the supervision of the Manipur University, the teaching learning and evaluation methods are reformed to autonomous or student centred learning method.
2. The academic council of the Manipur University approved our proposal of 40 :60 continuous internal assessment and end semester assessment.
3. Introduce continuous Internal Evaluation (CIA) for 40 marks and 60 marks for Semester End Examination.
4. College introduce grading system at the 7 point scale
5. Teachers are reoriented in evaluation and autonomy learning system by conducting workshop under the Government sponsorship.
6. Confirmed to open two more career oriented courses from 2015 June session under the U.G.C scheme of COC.
7. The Academic Council of the College forwarded its recommendation to the GB for opening of PG and to take necessary plan for research guide in the college.
8. The college become autonomous from the 2014-15 sessions. Hence the college is conducting autonomous and affiliated semester

9. The first and second semester have been conducted successfully
10. Food processing and quality control and communicative and functional English lab have been established for 2 more COC's.
11. Institutional and departmental preparations are important for the successful implementation of autonomous teaching and evaluation reforms. IQAC concentrated on them and conducted a 3 day workshop on technique of paper setting and evaluation; and a 2-day workshop on "Teaching Methodology based on Autonomous learning" which was sponsored by the Directorate of the Hr. Edn. Govt. of Manipur.
12. Botany Dept. has been extended by renovating one more laboratory cum classroom
13. An indoor stadium and a swimming pool have been inaugurated by the Hon'ble Edn. Minister, Govt. of Manipur and by the Hon'ble Social Welfare and Cooperation, Minister, Manipur
14. The laboratory of Physics Dept. has been improved with more infrastructural materials.
15. One laboratory of Environmental Dosimetry Laboratory has been established for major research project sponsored by AERB, Mumbai in Physics Dept.
16. Zoology laboratory, Departmental office and class room have been shifted to the Eastern block as the previous one has been damaged.
17. Hand on workshops have been organised in Institutional Bio-Tech hub.

Student's response could not be utilised effectively as regards the end semester feedback system. It is imperatively felt that the feedback be collected monthly by the Dean. The doubt and inhibition of the new students need to be redressed by maintaining a mechanism of confidentiality. IQAC faced a big hurdle in the form of teachers not co-operating timely. Strict disciplinary action could not be initiated as it is not under the jurisdiction of IQAC. A need for objective approach and understanding is highly felt.
