6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

The curriculum prescribed by the affiliating University was developed partially by introducing two value added courses in $1^{3} \& 2^{1}$ semesters and one honours supportive course in 3^{rd} semester.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

Teaching and learning is substantially improved by introducing two ICT supported class rooms and changing the old teacher- centred teaching-learning method to student- centred/autonomous teaching- learning method as far as practicable.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

Examination and Evaluation is improved by introducing the system of continuous internal assessment (CIA) and semester end examination system for each semester.

6.3.4 Research and Development

Some teachers are carrying on research works with or without financial aids from funding agencies. Sustainable development of research facilities have been maintained in the institution.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure/instrumentation

There is one Central Library with the capacity of 100students. Standard text and reference books are provided in the library, ICT infrastructure and Inflibnet facility, through which e-books &ejournals can be opened, have been installed in the library.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The non-teaching staff were assigned to their respective works and teachers are also allocated their duties by the respective Heads. Teachers were allowed to participate refresher/orientation/workshop courses at different Institutions inside or outside the state for improvement of knowledge from time to time. Mechanisms were provided for the students to useful college time inside the classrooms/library/concerned departments.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Recruitment of faculty and staff is done by the State Government. The institution requests the Government to fill up the vacant posts of the College in time.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction /Collaboration

The Institution organised an International Conference cum Workshop on Bamboo in collaboration with Salai Holdings Pvt. Ltd.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

The College conducted Entrance test for admission to B.A./B.Sc. 1^{s} semester. Counseling sessions were held for successful candidates and admission was undertaken according to the available seats.

For Examination reforms, the College introduced Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) and Semester End Examination system (SEES) in the ratio of 40:60 in theory as well as in practical portions. The CIA comprises OMR format question series technique, group discussion, project work and quiz, and the SEES consists of short, very short and essay type questions.

6.10 What efforts are made by the University to promote autonomy in the affiliated/constituent colleges?

To promote autonomy in the Colleges the University did not inter-fare the admission process, accounts and arrangement of holding University examinations at the affiliated colleges. It encourages some colleges to become autonomous ones.

Alumni Association extends its support physically and/or morally to the activities of the College, e.g. in the activities of cleanliness, protection from unwanted elements, minor repairing of furniture, etc.of the College.

About 75% of the teaching staff are Ph.D. holders, 20% are M.Phil. holders and the rest are senior experienced teachers. The UGC approved autonomous status to the College. The College got local supports and the alumni association extend its cooperation to the college activities.

In view of the strict and heavy study of the students, below averaged students may miss their position to get admission to the college and this may have minimum effect to the number of students in the college. This is our supposition. Or, Unwanted & unreasonable disturbance to the academic atmosphere from outside the college.

Outcomes achieved by the endoftheyear2014-2015

- 1. In order to maintain the standard of the affiliating University in matters of examination in the college, the Examination Committee of the college passed, in consonance with the Ordinance-2 of the college, resolutions to regulate double evaluation system whereby Question Papers are set internally which are moderated by external experts from the affiliating university and other sister colleges. Similarly both internal teachers and external experts are involved in answer script evaluation.
- Two more COCs namely Food Processing and Quality Control, and Communication Skill and Functional English were started from 2015-16 session in addition to the existing COCs.
- 3. Recognizing the role of students in the development higher education, and students' participation as a best practice, a structural type has been formulated wherein the positive and participative mind can be tapped and turned into life-long learning.
- 4. The departments deemed to upgrade as PG departments had been motivated for mental and physical preparedness for the same. A road-map has been prepared to achieve the target by 2017-18 session.
- Recognizing the importance of an IT department in this era of e-governance and digital world, the state Directorate of University and Higher Education has given acceptance to start certificate and diploma courses in IT from 2016-17 session.
- 6. The Academic Monitoring Committee has been made more powerful by incorporating the Deans of the two faculties - Science and Arts. The Deans are entrusted to regularly monitor attendance of students and to collect feedback on teaching-learning process of the departments under their streams. The Academy Monitoring Committee and the Examination Committee closely see that the CIA (Continuous and Comprehensive Internal Assessment) process is going on as per regulation and ordinance of the college.
- 7. The college has developed a comprehensive feedback format of its own by adapting the best formats of other institutions in the country.

- 8. The college encourages teacher's research for increasing knowledge which would contribute to national development as well as for personal API. With this end, the college has decided to have a regular indexed research publication. The annual publication has been planned to start from 2016.
- The proposal for renovation of the Central Library under RUSA fund was accepted by the Planning Committee. It has been entrusted to the Infra-structure and Building Construction Committee of the college.
- 10. The eastern portion Science Block and Geography Department had been repaired on priority basis.
- 11. The college started publishing the Annual Academic bulletin under the aegis of the IQAC.
- 12. Tree plantation program was organized in the foundation day celebration of the college on 8thAugust to maintain eco-friendly campus.
- 13. Talk programs were organized at institutional as well as departmental level with external experts. One state level workshop on autonomous learning and evaluation system, and one international conference on bamboo was organized in connection with the World Bamboo Day.
- 14. For ensuring security and all amenities of the college hostellers, the local guardian and alumni association has been entrusted to look after them.
- 15. Repairing and up-gradation of desktops and laptops of the different departments, Library and office have been done.
- 16. Smart megaphones have been provided to facilitate lecture in big classes.

ANNEXURE-IV

Challenges Encountered During the Period:

The college experienced the following constraints and limitations.

- **1.** Examination Cell- conduct and arrangement of examination, answer script evaluation, declaration of results- requires enough manpower for smooth and effective implementation of the system. Separate enforcement of examination staff is required.
- **2.** There is a need for a separate infrastructure of examination section for maintaining secrecy and for confidential work.

Problems encountered by the college:

- **1.** Academic and campus infrastructural up gradation plan of the college including examination block cannot achieve the target due to the constraint of being a government college.
- 2. Shortage of examination support staff.
- 3. Machines and furniture of Examination office are lacking.
- 4. Financial resource mobilization is required.
